Dr. Kever's book is a must-read for everyone who thinks the New York Times gives them "all" the news. This book is especially important for all students of journalism. The author's comprehensive research into why the NYT did not print important information and details about "the bomb" is shocking. The impact of News Zero revelations should resound worldwide--it combines the past and present horrors of mass destruction and highlights people groups who are still dealing with the damaging effects of decisions made decades ago. Excellent! Bravo!

Great book.

It's probably no coincidence that the NYT and other major media have not reviewed this important book - being that it is, in part, an indictment of how a major news organization has consistently descended into what Steve Leeper (who served seven years as director of the Hiroshima Museum), has called "nuclear denialism." This is especially true in the matter of denying long term radiation effects in Hiroshima and Nagasaki and even as recently as 2010 denying that people were actually disintegrated under the bombs of August, 1945. The NY Times embedded reporter during and after the atomic bombing of Nagasaki, directly participated in denialism, as the author points out, while accepting pay from both the government and the NYT. (Slight conflict of interest there.) This book is important history - memorializing events up through the current denialism problem (to say nothing of how we we killed off our own towns in Utah with fallout from nuclear testing) - and unfortunately, the book has been sentenced to what has turned out to be stealth publication.
