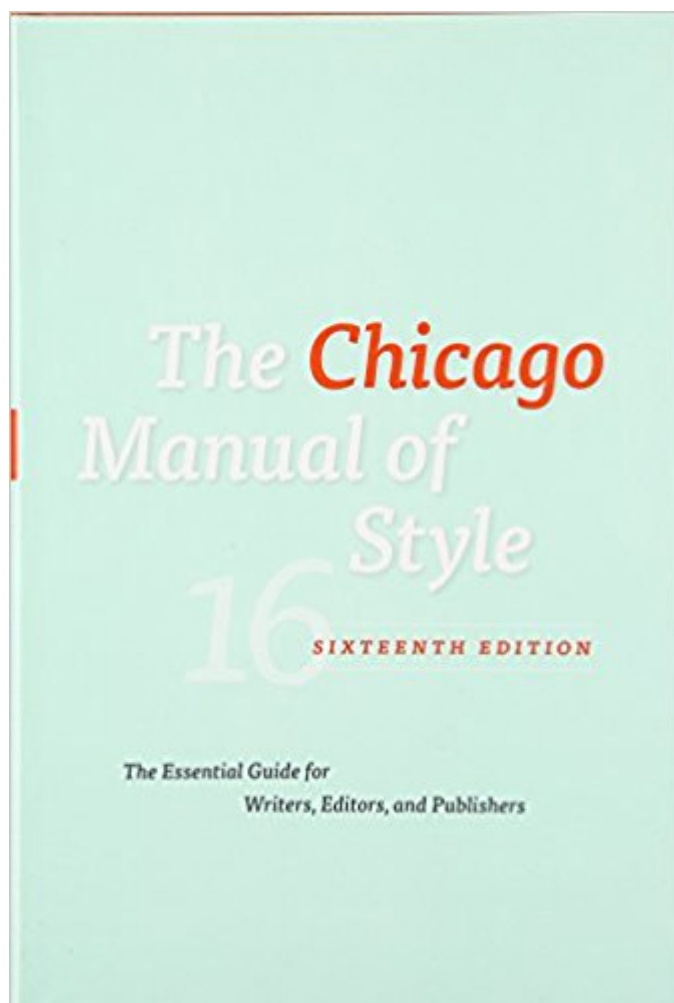


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The Chicago Manual Of Style, 16th Edition

I bought this book because I had a book manuscript that was accepted for publication, the publishers required the Chicago Manual, and I had an individual I wanted to do the copy editing (publisher agreed). This one is clearly a major reference work for any writer's library, although as a practicing scientist publishing in journals, I encountered a number of different editorial styles. Chicago can seem a little strange at times, but this buy was a real bargain. I bought it used, advertised as in good shape, and it is in truly excellent shape.

With the explosion of online publishing there's been an explosion of quite another kind. Poor editing or none whatsoever. As a reviewer I often have cringed while reading some of the indie books that I've crossed paths with. Mind you, I didn't major in English, but I know when there is a problem. Many authors have no idea what is wrong. Seriously, I've seen this sort of thing constantly and as a result, I simply have started turning down requests. I do have the "Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association" and have relied on that for many years, simply as a matter of habit because I started out with it in grad school and need it for nonfiction writing and reference. The impetus toward purchasing "The Chicago Manual of Style" came when a friend asked me to proofread her latest manuscript. I'm not an editor, but decided I'd take the time and work through it. Mind you, she had already paid someone to edit the manuscript. Needless to say, my friend was somewhat livid ... at the editor. I've proofread Braille for many, many years and know a mess when I see it. My friend claimed that her editor knew "The Chicago Manual of Style" from cover to cover. Not very likely. I decided to purchase this reference to point out exactly where her editor had

gone wrong. This is an astounding reference that I found not only speaks to standard print media, but also to production and digital technology. With so many people moving to this format, it's critical that standards are set and followed. The demise of the book as we've come to know it isn't imminent, but why settle for mediocrity in the digital publishing world? I'm not an editor, not will I ever be one. If I need one, I'll know who not to hire from experience. Everyone who works in the world of words, or simply is wowed by them, should invest in this essential reference. If you have a choice of a single reference, this should be one you invest in.
