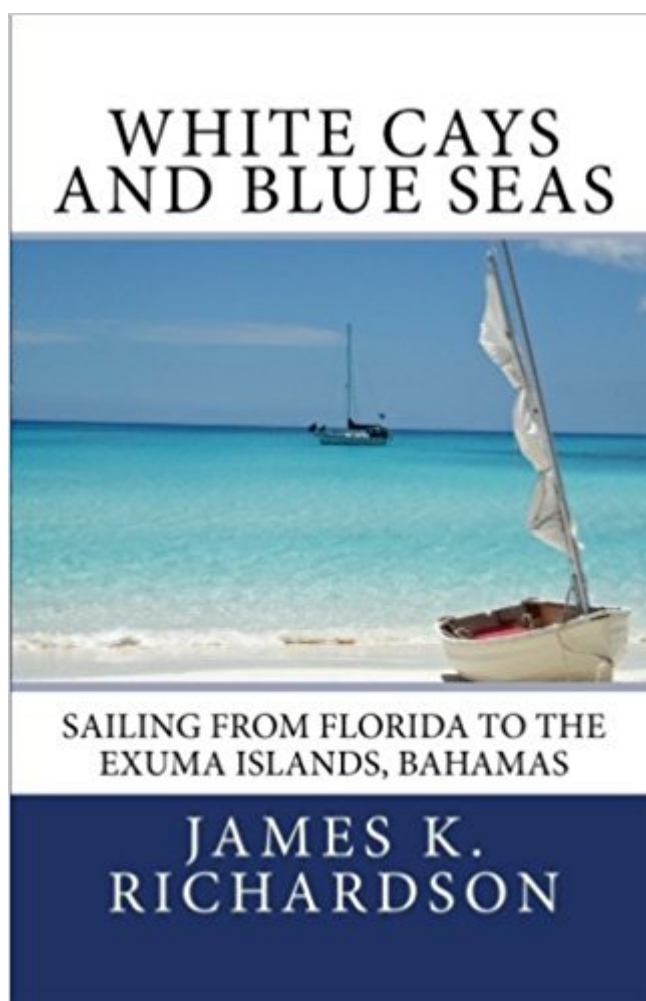

On the other hand, if you are planning to cruise the Caribbean, there is lots of specific information in this book that would come in handy for you. The author has a web site you can also check out.
