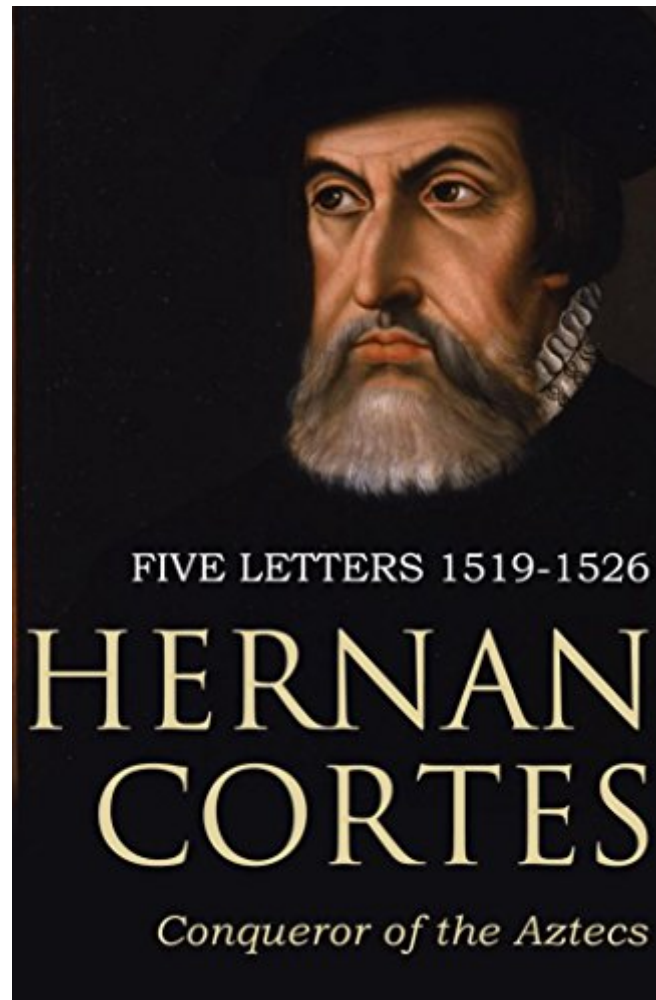




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Five Letters Of Cortes To The Emperor: 1519 -1526

Cortés was part of the generation of Spanish colonizers who began the first phase of the Spanish colonization of the Americas. He died in 1547.
